Black films made between the 1920's and the 1950's reacted to American blockbusters

made by such white movie moguls as D. W. Griffith.

Friday, March 24 The Celluloid Closet (1996)

This documentary traces the history and influence of gay and lesbian participation in

the American film industry.

Friday, March 31 The Hollywood Style (1994)

The work of American screen writers, directors, and technical professionals brings a

particular identity to American movie storytelling.
